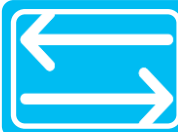

Trust is the foundation of any successful partnership. Without it, communication falters, leading to misunderstandings and disengagement. To build trust, stakeholders should focus on:

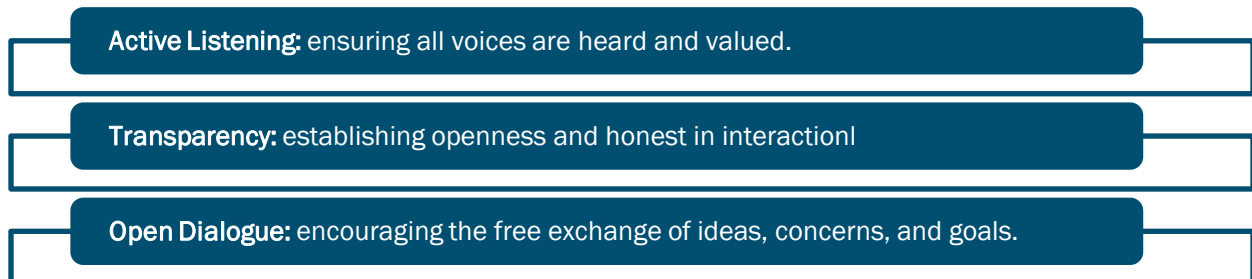


Figure 2. Outline of the three major ways to establish trust as a foundation for successful partnerships.

Building rapport with families in the juvenile justice system is critical to establishing trust. Key strategies include:

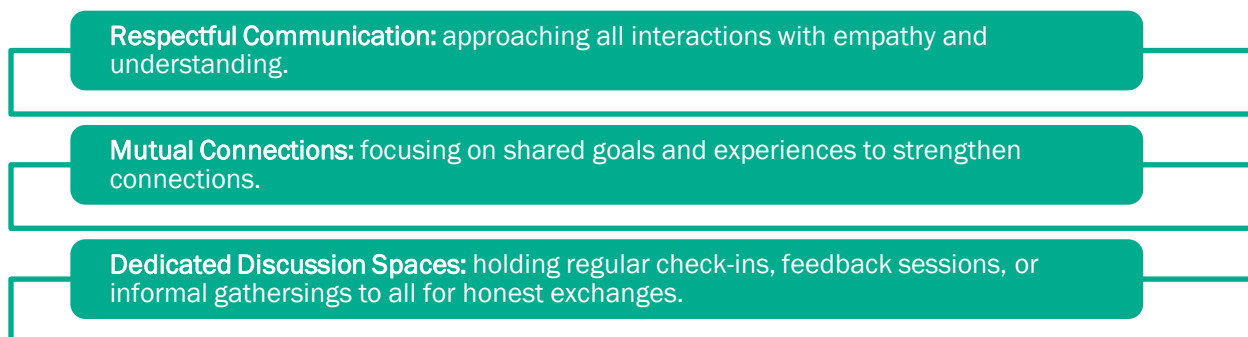


Figure 3. Outline of key strategies to build connections with families in the juvenile justice system.

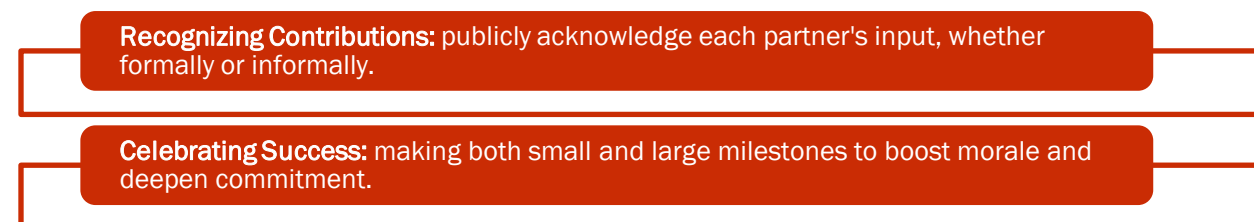


Figure 4. Additional strategies to strengthen connections with stakeholders in the juvenile justice system.
